How does repentance show you have a broken heart and contrite spirit? Ted E. Brewerton wrote, "In a very real way, repentance is one of the gifts we give to our Savior when we 'offer a sacrifice unto the Lord [our]

God in righteousness, even that of a broken heart and a contrite spirit' (D&C 59:8)" ("Rejoice in Christ," Ensign, Dec. 1984, 7).



How does Godly sorrow demonstrate you have a broken heart and contrite spirit? Ezra Taft Benson said: "Godly sorrow ... is a deep realization that our actions have offended our Father and our God. It is the

sharp and keen awareness that our behavior caused the Savior. He who knew no sin, even the greatest of all, to endure agony and suffering. Our sins caused him to bleed at every pore. This very real mental and spiritual anguish is what the scriptures refer to as having 'a broken heart and a contrite spirit" ("A Mighty Change of Heart," Ensign, Oct. 1989, 4).



How does living the law of sacrifice prepare you for exaltation? Joseph Smith said: "All the saints of whom we have account, in all the revelations of God which are extant, obtained the knowledge which they had of their

acceptance in his sight through the sacrifice which they offered unto him" (Joseph Smith, comp., Lectures on Faith [1985], 70).
